# **IBSA Dialogue Forum**

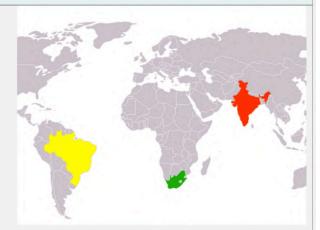


#### Why in the news?

#### **IBSA Dialogue Forum**

- What is it?: The IBSA Dialogue Forum (India, Brazil, South Africa) is an international tripartite grouping for promoting international cooperation among these countries.
- Formation
  - · Created in 2003.
  - The grouping was formalised under the name of the IBSA Dialogue Forum under the Brasilia Declaration.
- Significance
  - It represents three important poles for galvanizing South-South cooperation.
  - The forum provides the three countries with a platform to engage in discussions for cooperation in the field of agriculture, trade, culture, and defence among others.
- · IBSA Fund:
  - It was established in 2004 which facilitates the execution of human development projects to advance the fight against poverty and hunger in developing countries.
  - It is managed by the UN Office for South-South Cooperation (UNOSSC).
- Defence Grouping: IBSAMAR is a joint multinational maritime exercise, among the Indian, Brazilian and South African navies which is an important part of defence cooperation among these countries.

### Why in the news?

## **BRICS Grouping**

#### Formation

- → In 2001, the British Economist Jim O'Neill coined the term BRIC to describe the four emerging economies of Brazil, Russia, India, and China.
- → The grouping was formalised during the first meeting of BRIC Foreign Ministers' in 2006.
- → Founded in 2009.
- → South Africa was invited to join BRIC in December 2010, after which the group adopted the acronym BRICS.
- BRICS: Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa.
- New Members: Egypt, Iran, Saudi Arabia, UAE, Ethiopia, Indonesia.
- <u>Partner Countries</u>: Belarus, Bolivia, Cuba, Kazakhstan, Malaysia, Thailand, Uganda, and Uzbekistan.

#### • Facts:

- → The BRICS brings together five of the largest developing countries of the world, representing 41% of the global population, 24% of the global GDP and 16% of the global trade.
- → The chairmanship of the forum is rotated annually among the members, in accordance with the acronym B-R-I-C-S.

## • Objectives:

- → Promote peace, security, and development in member countries and globally.
- → Reform international financial and governance institutions (e.g., IMF, World Bank) to reflect emerging economies' interests.
- → Enhance multilateral trade and investment, cooperation in various sectors (technology, finance, health).







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→ Encourage people-to-people exchanges and cultural ties.

## • Key Initiatives:

- → New Development Bank (NDB): Established in 2014 at the BRICS summit in Fortaleza, Brazil. Provides funding for infrastructure and sustainable development projects in BRICS and other emerging economies.
- → Contingent Reserve Arrangement (CRA): A framework to support members in case of short-term balance of payment pressures.
- → BRICS Business Council & Think Tank Council: Strengthens economic ties and policy coordination.

### • Significance:

- → Provides a platform for non-Western countries to voice their perspectives in global governance.
- → Promotes South-South cooperation.
- → Acts as a counterbalance to Western-dominated institutions like G7 and NATO.
- → Encourages a multipolar world order.

## • Challenges:

- → Divergent national interests (e.g., India-China border disputes).
- → Economic and political differences may hinder deeper integration.
- → Criticism of lacking a clear institutional structure or binding charter.

#### **Norway**

- Location: Nordic country located on the Scandinavian Peninsula in Northern Europe.
- · Capital: Oslo
- Border Countries: Sweden, Finland and Russia
- Bordering Waterbodies: Barents Sea, the Norwegian Sea, the North Sea.
- Climate: Subarctic Climate and Tundra Climate.
- International Grouping: North Atlantic Treaty
  Organization (NATO), the Council of Europe and the
  European Free Trade Association (EFTA).



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## 4. Astrosat Mission

#### Why in the news?

• Astrosat mission, India's first Space observatory completes 10 years.

## **Astrosat Mission**

#### • What is it?:

- → ASTROSAT is India's first dedicated **multi-wavelength space observatory**, launched by ISRO in 2015 from Satish Dhawan Space Centre (Sriharikota) using the PSLV-C30.
- → It marked India's entry into the league of space observatories like NASA's Hubble Space Telescope (HST) and ESA's XMM-Newton, but at a much lower cost.

## Objectives of the Mission;

- → To **study celestial sources** in multiple wavelengths (X-ray, Ultraviolet, Visible light).
- → To understand **high-energy processes** in binary star systems, star birth regions, supernovae, and active galactic nuclei.
- → To perform a sky survey in the ultraviolet region.
- → To monitor variability of cosmic sources over a wide range of timescales.

### • Payloads:

#### → UVIT (Ultraviolet Imaging Telescope):

- ★ Operates in far UV, near UV, and visible bands.
- ★ High-resolution imaging of star-forming regions, galaxies, nebulae.

#### → LAXPC (Large Area X-ray Proportional Counter):

- ★ Studies time variability of X-ray sources.
- ★ Useful for detecting neutron stars, black holes, and X-ray binaries.
- → SXT (Soft X-ray Telescope): Provides spectra and images in the soft X-ray region.

## → CZTI (Cadmium Zinc Telluride Imager):

- ★ Hard X-ray detection (10–100 keV).
- ★ Also helps in **Gamma-ray burst studies** and polarization measurements.





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→ SSM (Scanning Sky Monitor): Monitors and detects transient X-ray sources.

#### • Achievements:

- → Detected ultraviolet light from galaxies beyond the Milky Way.
- → Contributed to the discovery of highly variable X-ray sources.
- → Helped in the study of gamma-ray bursts and black hole candidates.
- → Produced multi-wavelength simultaneous data, rare in global astronomy.
- → Its **CZTI instrument** helped detect gravitational wave events (by studying associated gamma-ray bursts).

# • Significance:

- → Boosted India's space-based astronomy capability.
- → Allowed **Indian scientists access** to a multi-wavelength observatory at affordable cost.
- → Helped in **capacity building** for future space telescopes (e.g., ISRO's proposed **XPoSat**, Aditya-L1, etc.).
- → Promoted **international collaboration**, with participation from Canadian, UK, and US institutions.

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# 5. National Security Act (NSA) of 1980

## National Security Act (NSA) of 1980

## • What is it?:

- → The National Security Act (NSA) was enacted in 1980 by the Parliament of India.
- → NSA empowers the Central and State governments to detain individuals to maintain public order and national security.
- → It replaced earlier preventive detention laws such as the Preventive Detention Act, 1950 and the Maintenance of Internal Security Act (MISA), 1971.

#### • Key Provisions:

- → Preventive Detention Powers: An individual can be detained to prevent them from acting in a manner prejudicial to-
  - ★ Defence of India
  - ★ Security of India
  - ★ Relations of India with foreign powers
  - ★ Security of the State
  - ★ Maintenance of public order
  - ★ Maintenance of supplies and services essential to the community.

#### **→** Duration of Detention:

- ★ Initial detention: Up to 3 months without obtaining the opinion of an Advisory Board.
- ★ With Advisory Board's approval: can be extended to 12 months (in practice, renewable periodically).

## → Advisory Board:

★ Consists of **three High Court judges** (appointed by the President).







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- ★ Reviews detention cases and gives opinion on justification of detention.
- → Authority to Detain: Central Government, State Governments, and certain empowered District Magistrates/Commissioners.
- → No Judicial Proceedings Required Initially: Detention under NSA is preventive, not punitive, hence no trial or charge sheet is necessary at the initial stage.

### • Constitutional Basis:

- → Preventive detention is permitted under Article 22 of the Indian Constitution.
- → Provides a legal framework, but is considered an exception to the fundamental right to personal liberty under Article 21.

## Advantages:

- → Protection of National Security:
  - ★ Provides a **legal tool** to detain individuals whose activities threaten the **defence of India**, security of the state, or foreign relations.
  - ★ Useful in countering espionage, sabotage, and terrorist activities before they materialize.

#### → Maintenance of Public Order:

- ★ Helps prevent **riots**, **communal violence**, **and organized crime** by enabling pre-emptive detention of potential troublemakers.
- ★ Assists district administration in **controlling large-scale law-and-order disturbances** where ordinary criminal laws may be insufficient.
- → Ensuring Essential Supplies and Services: Can be invoked to stop black-marketing, hoarding, smuggling, and disruptions of essential commodities/services, thereby safeguarding community welfare.
- → Prevention Rather than Punishment: Unlike punitive laws, NSA is preventive in nature, aiming to avert crimes and threats before they occur, reducing chances of damage or loss of life.
- → Emergency Situations Management:





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- ★ Gives governments a **swift response mechanism** in exceptional circumstances, when gathering evidence and conducting trials may be difficult or time-consuming.
- ★ E.g., during communal flare-ups, mass protests turning violent, or intelligence-based terror threats.
- → Empowers Both Centre and States: Enables federal and state governments (and even District Magistrates) to act quickly without waiting for lengthy central approvals.

#### • Criticism:

- → Violation of Fundamental Rights: Allows deprivation of liberty without trial
- → Potential for Misuse: Used against political opponents, journalists, or peaceful protesters.
- → Vague Grounds: Terms like "public order" and "national security" are broad and open to subjective interpretation.
- → Judicial Scrutiny Limited: Courts generally intervene only in cases of procedural lapses, not on the merits of detention.

#### • Judicial Pronouncements:

- → A.K. Gopalan v. State of Madras (1950): Preventive detention upheld as constitutional under Article 22.
- → Maneka Gandhi v. Union of India (1978): Expanded Article 21; preventive detention still allowed but subject to fairness and reasonableness.
- → Justice Krishna Iyer in preventive detention cases Called the law a "necessary evil" in democracy.

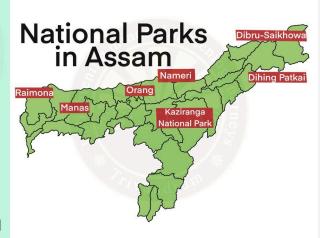
## Why in the news?

# **Kaziranga National Park**

- · Location: Assam
- **Formation**: It was created in the year of 1904.
- · Protection Status
  - · 1974: National Park
  - 1985: UNESCO World Heritage Site
  - 2007: Tiger Reserve
- Recognition: The park has been identified as an Important Bird Area by the Birdlife International Society
- Associated River: River Brahmaputra, Diphlu River
- **Big Four Species**: Rhino, Elephant, Royal Bengal tiger, and Asiatic water buffalo.





- **Vegetation:** It is a mix of eastern wet alluvial grasslands, semi evergreen forests and tropical moist deciduous forests.
- **Fauna:** One Horned Rhino ,Fishing Cat , Royal Bengal tiger , Barking deer, Hog deer, western hoolock gibbon.
