- Bordering Countries: Gaza Strip of Palestine, Israel, Sudan, Libya.
- Bordering Waterbodies: Mediterranean Sea, Red Sea.
 - The Gulf of Aqaba in the northeast separates Egypt from Jordan and Saudi Arabia.
- River: Egypt is known for Nile delta and Aswan Dam.
- **Climate:** Egypt has both mediterranean type climate and desert type climate.

Indian Wolf

- <u>About:</u> Indian grey wolf (Canis lupus pallipes) is a subspecies of grey wolf found across Southwest Asia and the Indian subcontinent.
- <u>Distribution in India:</u> It is mainly found across central, western, and northern India, spanning sixteen states with major populations in Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Rajasthan, and Karnataka.
- <u>Habitat</u>: It is an apex predator in India's scrublands, grasslands and semi-arid agro-ecosystems.
- Threats: Habitat loss, persecution, and human-wildlife conflict.
- Conservation Status:
 - → IUCN Status: Vulnerable.
 - → CITES: Appendix I.
 - → Wildlife Protection Act, 1972: Schedule I.

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4. Coups in Africa and Impact on India

Coups in Africa and Impact on India

<u>Countries Recently Witnessing Coups:</u> Mali (2020 & 2021), Guinea (2021), Chad (202), Sudan (2021 (renewed conflict in 2023)), Burkina Faso (2022 two coups), Niger (2023), Gabon (2023) and Madagascar (2025).

• Causes Behind the Coups:

- → Weak Institutions: Fragile democracies and poor constitutional enforcement.
- → Economic Hardship: Inflation, unemployment, and lack of basic services.
- → Security Vacuum: Jihadist and separatist insurgencies in the Sahel.
- → Foreign Influence: Rivalries among France, Russia, China, and the US.
- → Anti-Colonial Sentiment: Resentment toward continued Western control.
- → Climate Stress: Desertification and conflict over scarce resources.
- → Elite Corruption and Governance Fatigue: Popular frustration with failed leadership.

• Impact on India:

- → Diplomatic and Strategic Impact:
 - ★ Reduced Democratic Leverage: India promotes democratic cooperation in Africa; coups weaken that alignment.
 - ★ UN Peacekeeping Challenges: India's troops in Congo, South Sudan, and Mali face risks as mandates change or missions collapse.
 - ★ Geopolitical Competition: China deepens economic control through debt and infrastructure. Russia expands via arms deals and private military firms.
 - ★ Regional Instability: May expand terror networks (Boko Haram, ISIS affiliates) that destabilize Indian missions and UN peacekeepers.







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→ Economic and Energy Impact:

- ★ Trade Disruptions: Africa accounts for nearly 9% of India's global trade. Instability delays infrastructure, telecom, and energy projects.
- ★ Critical Minerals Risk: Niger (uranium), Mali (gold), and DRC/Zambia (cobalt, lithium) are vital for India's energy transition and semiconductor manufacturing.
- ★ Energy & Logistics: Instability near the Gulf of Guinea or Red Sea raises shipping costs and marine insurance rates.

- · Location: North-western Europe.

- Climate: Temperate maritime climate with cool summers and mild winters, influenced by the North Sea.
- · Features:
 - Around 26% of the land lies below sea level.

Fare se Fursat Fixed Airfare Scheme

• What is it?:

- → Fare Se Fursat is a first-of-its-kind fixed airfare initiative launched by Alliance Air, India's government-owned regional airline.
- → It introduces a single, fixed ticket price that remains constant irrespective of booking time, season, or demand, even for last-minute travel.

• Aim:

- → To democratize air travel and make it:
 - ★ Affordable for middle-class and first-time flyers.
 - ★ Transparent by removing hidden fare variations.
 - ★ Stress-free by ending dynamic pricing fluctuations.
- → Promotes **inclusive aviation** and bridges the connectivity gap between major cities and smaller towns.

• Key Features:

- → Fixed Pricing: One constant fare per route—unchanged even on the day of departure.
- → Passenger Friendly Approach: Removes uncertainty due to dynamic ticket prices.
- → Inclusive Focus: Designed to attract passengers from Tier-2 and Tier-3 cities.
- → Aligns with UDAN: Supports the vision of "Naye Bharat ki Udaan"- viewing aviation as a public service rather than purely profit-oriented.

• Significance:

- → Promotes Regional Connectivity, Tourism, and Balanced Regional Development.
- → Reinforces the UDAN (Ude Desh ka Aam Nagrik) objective—"Let the common citizen of the country fly."
- → Serves as a model for fare transparency in India's aviation sector.





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7. Corals and Tipping Point

Why in the news?

 Warm-water coral reefs have been identified as the world's first climate tipping point, according to the Global Tipping Points Report 2025.

Corals

• What is it?:

- → Corals are calcareous rocks, formed from the skeletons of minute sea animals, called polyps.
- → The polyps extract calcium salts from seawater to form hard skeletons which protect their soft bodies.
- → The corals live in colonies fastened to the rocky seafloor.
- → Corals are examples of symbiotic relations which live with algae called zooxanthellae

• Conditions for Growth of Corals:

- → Corals thrive in tropical waters-between 30°N and 30°S latitudes.
- → The ideal depths for coral growth are 45 m to 55 m below sea surface, where there is abundant sunlight available.
- → The temperature of water should be around 20°C.
- → Clear salt water is suitable for coral growth.
- → Adequate supply of oxygen and microscopic marine food, called plankton, is essential for growth and existence.

• Reasons for Degradations of Corals:

- → Ocean Warming: Causes coral bleaching by expelling symbiotic algae.
- → Ocean Acidification: Weakens coral skeletons due to lower pH.
- → Coastal Pollution: Sewage, agricultural runoff, and sediments smother corals.
- → Overfishing: Disrupts reef food chains and ecological balance.
- → Coral Mining: Extraction for construction and lime destroys habitats.
- → Tourism Pressure: Anchoring, trampling, and waste degrading reefs.
- → Marine Debris: Plastic and nets entangle and suffocate corals.





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- → **Diseases:** Microbial and fungal infections increase with stress.
- → Climate-Induced Storms: Cyclones and hurricanes physically break coral structures.

Tipping Point

• **<u>Definition:</u>** A climate tipping point refers to a threshold beyond which a small change in global temperature can trigger a self-reinforcing and potentially irreversible shift in a natural system.

• In the Context of Corals:

- → For coral reefs, this threshold is estimated to lie between 1°C and 1.5°C of warming.
- → Once exceeded, reefs can rapidly degrade, leading to bleaching, coral death, and transformation into algae-dominated ecosystems.

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8. United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC)

Why in the news?

• India has been elected unopposed to the Human Rights Council for the seventh time for a three-year term (2026-28) starting next year.

United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC)

- What is it?: The United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) is the principal inter-governmental body within the UN system responsible for promoting and protecting human rights globally.
- **Formation:** It replaced the former UN Commission on Human Rights in 2006 through UN General Assembly Resolution 60/251.
- Headquarters: Geneva, Switzerland
- Members: 47 States, elected by the UN General Assembly through secret ballot.
- <u>Term:</u> 3 years (eligible for only two consecutive terms).
- Functions:
 - → Promotion and protection of human rights across the world.
 - → Addressing human rights violations through dialogue, investigation, and resolutions.
 - → Universal Periodic Review (UPR): A peer-review mechanism where each UN member's human rights record is reviewed every 4–5 years.
 - → Special Procedures: Appointment of Special Rapporteurs and Independent Experts on thematic or country-specific issues.
 - → Advisory Committee: Provides expert research-based advice to the Council.
 - → Complaint Procedure: Enables individuals or groups to bring consistent patterns of human rights violations to attention.
